#### In 2022, Hearts of Blue contributed more than \$51,272 to charities across Alberta.

## Calgary Food Bank

The Calgary Food Bank is Calgary's main charitable and most accessible food hub that provides emergency food support to families, individuals and organizations in need.

## **Veterans Food Bank of Calgary**

### A Safe Place

A Safe Place is operated by the Strathcona Shelter Society and provides shelter, safety and support for women and children who have suffered from domestic violence and sexual assault. A Safe Place's New Beginnings program provides departing clients with household goods to help them get started in their own safe home.

**August:** On August 29, **Carolyn Arsenault** delivered cutting boards, toasters, towels and laundry baskets to the New Beginnings program, as well as fitted crib sheets and stuffed animals.

**Centre of Hope** 

Centre of Hope is a faith-based agency supporting those experiencing homelessness and at risk of homelessness by helping them toward self-sufficiency. As Fort McMurray's only daytime dropin centre, they work to make a positive difference in their community.

**December:** On December 17, **Mirella Nardi** delivered an upright freezer to the Centre of Hope in Fort McMurray.

Thank you again for this wonderful donation. It will impact our ability to freeze donated food items and to purchase healthier frozen foods for our patrons. The freezer is filled with bread and bagels, which is fantastic, as we didn't have the ability to keep bread products prior to owning this freezer.

Jessie's House

Jessie's House provides family violence

outreach, case management and court support for people fleeing abuse. This emergency shelter assists all in need including men, women, children, teens and the LGBTQ2+ community.

March: When Ashley Bolduc and Kristy Kozun visited Jessie's House, they were greeted by Louise and Sharon who took them on a tour of the house. Ashley and Kristy dropped off gift cards to help individuals and families fleeing abuse have the means to set up their new homes.

# **Kids Kottage Foundation**

Kids Kottage Foundation is a prevention and intervention shelter for infants and children in situations of family stress in Edmonton and area. Their mission is to keep children and infants safe while also providing families with resources for the future.

**March:** Hearts of Blue made donations to Kids Kottage Foundation in memory of Sara Haupf, a former advisor with one of Alberta Blue Cross's large group customers. After Sara's sudden passing, her family requested charitable donations be made in lieu of sending flowers, so **Gabriella Aparicio** delivered sensory toys, water tables and toys, arts and crafts bead kits and LEGO sets.



## **Lloydminster Interval Home**

The Lloydminster Interval Home provides shelter where women, children and youth in need can feel safe and supported. With a youth centre and thrift stores, the Lloydminster Interval Home supports those impacted by domestic violence and trauma.

**December: Mirella Nardi** dropped off bed bug mattress and pillowcase protectors, towels and comforters to the Lloydminster Interval Home.

**Strathmore Overnight Shelter** 

Pastor Elizabeth Karp and volunteers run the Strathmore Overnight Shelter with the goal of offering people a place to stay. The Strathmore Overnight Shelter provides dorms, hot meals, showers, laundry facilities, clothing, crisis counselling and referrals to help people in their time of need.

**April:** On April 11, **Amanda Croot** delivered laundry detergent, fabric softener, coffee and grocery gift cards to the Strathmore Overnight Shelter.

### **Be YOUth Centre**

The Be YOUth Centre provides free programming to Medicine Hat youth aged 11 to 17 years old. Through special interest activities and experiences, they create a fun and safe environment for youth to connect and feel empowered.

**December:** Mirella Nardi donated LEGO, craft supplies, games, batteries, a waffle maker, measuring spoons and other items to the Be Youth Centre to support their goal of improving the lives of youth in Medicine Hat and surrounding area.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Medicine Hat and District

The Big Brothers Big Sisters mentoring program provides boys and girls and young men and women with a role model. Through regular outings, the mentor and mentee develop relationships built on trust and common interests.

**November:** Craft supplies are a great way to break the ice and encourage bonding between mentors and kids at Big Brothers Big Sisters of Medicine Hat and District. **Amanda Croot** delivered craft and colouring kits, science kits, LEGO sets, construction paper, crayons, markers, pencil crayons, paints, glue to create slime and more.

### **Boys and Girls Club**

The Boys and Girls Club wishes for all children and youth to reach their dreams while becoming healthy and successful. Focused on belonging, respect, encouragement and support, collaboration and advocacy, the Boys and Girls Club provides safe, supportive places for children and youth.

**November: Mirella Nard**i donated a ping pong table, pool cues, bean bag chairs and arts and crafts supplies for the children and youth at the Boys and Girls Club.

### École Providence School

École Providence is a northern Alberta school providing education from early childhood to grade 8 with a strong focus on community and building connection.

**December:** To support École Providence School's wellness program, Hearts of Blue helped fund teen hygiene packages for 25 students in need from grades 5 to 8. **Jil Tanguay** coordinated the donation.

## **Kids Up Front Calgary**

Kids Up Front Calgary provides kids with enriching experiences around arts, culture and sports. They work to create joy and promote inclusion while encouraging kids to be a part of their communities.

## **Old Strathcona Youth Society**

The Old Strathcona Youth Society works to provide youth around Whyte Avenue with a safe place to gather, grow, be supported and meet people. As a resource for youth, this organization offers non-judgmental, flexible, street-level information to protect youth.

### **Pacekids**

Pacekids helps children thrive through therapy, education and play. They serve children with diverse needs including autism, cerebral palsy, global development delay, down syndrome and beyond in the Calgary area.

**July: Anita Quach** dropped off books, iPads and iPad supplies to Pacekids to support their empowering programs.

## **Santas Anonymous**

With the help of thousands of donors and volunteers, Santas Anonymous collects and delivers toys to more than 20,000 children each year. Santas Anonymous' mission is to see every child receive a present on Christmas.

**December:** On December 15, Hearts of Blue collected a carload of toys and raised \$1,897.76 for Santas Anonymous. **Ashley Bolduc** and **Kayla Sommer** visited the toy warehouse to drop off the donations.

# St. Catherine Catholic Elementary and Junior High School

St. Catherine Catholic Elementary and Junior High School is an Edmonton school that works to develop the intellectual, spiritual, social and emotional growth of their students. Around 35 per cent of the families at St. Catherine School are refugee families and most of the remaining are immigrant families.

**June:** St. Catherine School often works to gather winter jackets, snow pants and hats during the winter, but they struggle to get mittens. **Mariam Aoude** dropped off kids' pants, underpants, reusable water bottles, gloves and mittens to St. Catherine Catholic Elementary and Junior High School.



### **Youth Unlimited Edmonton**

Youth Unlimited Edmonton consists of compassionate youth specialists who provide holistic care, mentoring relationships, safe communities and opportunities to give back. Regardless of background, they help youth discover their unlimited potential.

August: On August 26, Holly Blum delivered various food items, crafts and art supplies to Youth Unlimited Edmonton. Many of the teens visiting the centre live in unsafe homes, and donations provide food, activity and a safe space.

Many of the kids who come in have not eaten that day or even in a couple of days, so they are able to come in and make a meal.

### Children's Link

Children's Link offers resources, information, connections and hope to families and professionals in the disability community. With more than 1,000 community resources, support groups, workshops and more, Children's Link provides a safe, accepting environment for people to learn, share and connect.

May: On May 25, **Amanda Croot** and **Sean Gallup**, along with Dennis Walton from Prairie-Wide Insurance Services Ltd., made a delivery to Children's Link. The donation included a television and a laptop to be used in their resource room by the families they provide services to.



## **Families First Society**

Fort Saskatchewan's Families First Society supports families through programs assisting early childhood development and family support. Families First Society is community-focused and creates a safe, nurturing environment while providing resources with the help of their partners.

**March:** Carolyn Arsenault brought a donation of diapers and formula to Families First Society to support families in need.

# Inn from the Cold Calgary

Inn from the Cold helps vulnerable families find stability in crises that often lead to homelessness through homeless prevention and diversion, emergency family shelter and supportive housing programming.

**June: Mirella Nardi** delivered sewing machines and sewing kits to Inn from the Cold Calgary's Indigenous Engagement program.

Neighbourlink Parkland helps individuals and families in need of basic items who are unable to access government assistance and other resources. They work to support their community's personal, emotional and spiritual needs through kindness and compassion.

## **Next Chapter Society**

Next Chapter Society supports children and parents that are rebuilding a family structure after a divorce or separation. Through programs, community partners and resources, Next Chapter Society helps Albertans navigate their family's transformation.

**April:** To support program facilitation and professional training, **Laurie Bayrak** worked with Next Chapter Society to buy a new laptop computer for the families in need.



# Norwood Child and Family Resource Centre

The Norwood Child and Family Resource Centre provides free programs and services to families with young children. They offer family coaching, home visitation, parent respite programs and parent education work groups.

**February:** On February 25, **Mirella Nardi** donated baby formula and diapers to the Norwood Child and Family Resource Centre.

## **Parkland Turning Points Society**

The Parkland Turning Points Society works to stop family violence and abuse to create healthier communities through education and treatment programs. They provide educational and counselling services for men, women, children and families.


socks, to Hope Mission.
